The Group Committee have recently invited the Mayor of Douglas to be our Patron. Historically, the Mayor has been patron of the 1st Douglas and we have enjoyed a good relationship with Douglas Town.

Finally, I thank the Group Committee, the Group Scoutmaster, Leaders, and Parents for their support and dedication to the 1st Douglas.

We had our Group Camp in May at Glen Lough and seven Cubs took part in the Island Cub Camp at Ramsey in June.

Tynwald Pack Camp was held at Ballasalla. During the weekend we visited the Craft Centre at Silverdale (after getting very dirty at Mull ny Carty) and all the Cubs painted a pot - many in the shape of a skull! These will become collector's items in years to come as they are all unique and will be priceless. They should cause great excitement on the Antiques Road Show 2104. On the Sunday morning we travelled by train to Castletown and returned by bus after a picnic lunch.

At the start of the Autumn term the older Cubs went on an Island day out by tram to the Venture Centre at Maughold. We had a team in the Cub Scout football competition and a joint team with Cushag Pack in the Marathon which we won. Well done boys!! As the dark nights arrived we had a hike along the Marine Drive without torches and we were able to stargaze (if only we knew what they were!) and see planes going in to land at Ronaldsway. We also had an environmental theme throughout the term which included a talk by Stephanie Grey on the benefits of recycling and the Cubs brought in newspapers etc and walked down to the recycling bins at Tescos with them. They also brought in books and comics for a "swap shop", an idea which we may well repeat. The Cubs who took part in the Cub Scout Challenge Competition helped run a Challenge night for the rest of the Pack as part of their Chief Scout's Challenge Badge. During the evening the Cubs had to sew on a button; read maps; recognise local landmarks; read timetables and do a sports quiz. We also had an International night to show how Scouting is worldwide. In December we had a Chinese night and finished the term with a Party. Four Cubs received their Chief Scouts Silver Award and Scout Moving On Award.

Our theme for the Winter term was 100 Years. We played games that children played 100 years ago; designed a futuristic car as the AA was 100 years old and also the first car to reach 100 mph was a 100 years ago; grew crystals, the biggest diamond was found 100 years ago; had a chocolate egg night as Cadburys are 100 years old. As Dr Bernado died 100 years ago we had a blindfold trail around the Hall to show what it was like going up chimneys etc. I did want to do a Sound of Music night as Maria Von Trapp was born 100 years ago but was out voted - I think it might have been my singing! The Cubs took part in a survey around the Hall and suggested ways to make it more welcoming. As a result we have run a competition to design a welcoming sign for the entrance hall which is yet to be judged. During Fair Trade week Gordon ran a Fair Trade night and the Cubs discovered how Bananas are traded around the world and were surprised to find how little money part of the chain earn. We had teams entered in Island events - An Art day; First Aid Competition and Scout Supersplash. All the Cubs did a lot of art during the term - self portraits (some were very scary), Collage pictures and Easter Cards. Most of them earned an Art Badge and all had at least one entry in an Art and Craft Competition run by the Cunningham House Committee, (Scout and Guide HQ) many winning certificates.

At present we only have 17 Cubs and 9 of those are now Scout age. They have decided to wait a few more weeks before going to Scouts as they are so near finishing their Silver Award and would like to do so. (They can start on their Moving On Badge by going to Scouts on a few "taster nights" if they check with Neil first.) This will leave us with only 8 Cubs. Hopefully we are about to get

another Beaver Colony and this will help eventually but if you know of any boys who are between 8 and 9 and would like to become Cubs please send them our way.

Once again I would like to thank the leaders for their time on a Wednesday evening and for the extra time they give for competitions etc. – especially Neil - without him I don't think I would have retained my sanity this past year! The biggest Thank You must go to the Cubs themselves as this has been a very busy year for me and I have not been able to give them the attention they deserve but they have all been very patient - thank you.

Together with our Scouting family around the world, our thoughts are with our brothers and sisters Scouts across the Asia Pacific Region.

I have traveled both to Sri Lanka and Sumatra. I have fished with men from Galle, and worked with Oxfam to provide pumps to provide fresh water in remote villages in Indonesia.



I have been thinking about the disaster with vivid personal memories of the places I went to and the people I met.

Many of our UK Members have been asking how best we can offer support and solidarity to the countries affected by the tsunami. **The Scout Association - Tsunami Appeal** is part of a global Scout effort to help Scouts rebuild their communities.

All of the money raised will go to fund work in the affected countries. For supporting the immediate disaster relief effort, we encourage anyone who wants to make a donation to do so direct to the Disaster Emergency Committee.

Since Boxing Day, there has been close contact with the organizations in those countries, and with the Asia Pacific Regional office.

Scouting in the Asia Pacific Region will be preparing a coordinated plan for the months ahead. This will prepare not only for the reconstruction of Scouting in those areas, but also for how Scouts can assist with the wider task of community regeneration.

I know you will give generously to the appeal. In the meantime, I know that all Scouts here in the UK join me in offering your thoughts and prayers to our brothers and sisters across the world.
